ACOMA: Currently fields five to seven crews a year doing traditional agriculture, preservation, trail work and a youth hiking club.

NAVAJO: Currently fields 14 to 18 crews a year doing chainsaw work, GIS mapping, erosion control and much more.

ZUNI: Currently fields three to five crews a year doing preservation, trail work and agricultural work.

HOPI: Currently fields two to three crews doing fencing and other projects.

INDIVIDUAL PLACEMENTS

AL Interns focus on career mentorship, Native community outreach and engagement, and exploring pathways within the agency.

AMERICORPS VISTA PLACEMENTS

AL VISTAs will work to build the capacity of Corps, Tribes, and Land Management Agencies to support more tribal-focused Corps programing around the country.



BIA WATERCORPS

A partnership between the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Stewards Individual Placements, the BIA WaterCorps provides Native individuals with a unique and rare opportunity to not only participate in the field as AmeriCorps service members in water resource positions, but also to receive intensive, inclassroom water resources training at the University of Arizona. 33 individuals have been placed at host sites around the country. This year WaterCorps welcomed several new host sites, with emphasis on placements with state and federal agencies as well as tribal resources departments and tribes themselves.


